

In Touch with TUSD

Students, teachers, staff, administrators and parents had another outstanding year in the Tustin Unified School District. It's impossible to capture the magic that happens in every classroom and school throughout the year; however, I want to emphasize just a few of the past school year's highlights:

- Seventeen TUSD elementary schools were recognized with Gold Ribbon Awards from the California Department of Education for excellent educational programs.
- Student achievement continues to grow by every academic measure – California Assessment of Student Performance and Progress (CAASPP) scores, Advanced Placement enrollment and test scores and college admissions.
- Tustin Unified high school seniors have been admitted in record number to universities and colleges throughout the nation.
- Tustin Memorial Academy teacher Courtney Smith was named Orange County Teacher of the Year – the fifth TUSD teacher in six years to be named a county teacher of the year.
- The Tustin Connect Center completed its first year of providing online education to students in kindergarten through eighth grade.
- The Pioneer Middle School Peer Assistance Leadership (PAL) program was recognized as Outstanding PAL Program of the Year by the Orange County Department of Education.
- The TUSD Robotics Program continues to grow! The middle school league has grown, and this year the District hosted its first elementary competition.
- Students made significant gains (approximately 5%) on statewide tests, improving in every grade in math and language arts.
- Student participation in the District's most rigorous of courses (Advanced Placement) continues to increase.

- Our high school graduation rate has risen to 98%.
- The District made progress in closing the achievement gap for all English Learners and low socioeconomic status subgroups.
- The TUSD staff is actively engaged in the District's mission:
 - Approximately 830 teachers participated in a two-day Summer Institute.
 - Nearly 400 classified and certificated staff participated in voluntary summer reading.
 - Over 1,250 employees participated in a staff survey, and 94% reported that they use their strengths at work every day.
- Tustin Unified expanded the robotics program to elementary schools, and now has a full K-12 program.
- The Family Intervention Resource Support Team (FIRST) served 580 students, organized 48 therapy groups, and conducted more than 280 therapy sessions.
- The number of suspensions and expulsions decreased by 49% and 24%, respectively, over the last two years.
- TUSD continues to be a leader in the implementation of technology into the instructional program. Over 180 educators from southern California attended the TUSD Connect Institute.
- The District completed 10 significant facilities improvement projects with another 11 in planning or under construction.
- TUSD reached an agreement to provide funding for a 6-12 magnet school at the Tustin Legacy development.

These accomplishments, and so many more, represent an enormous effort by teachers, staff, parents, Tustin Public Schools Foundation and other partners who care about the education of every child in Tustin Unified. Many thanks to them for their work and passion they share in preparing our students for bright futures. I also want to thank the School Board for the leadership and guidance they provide to all of us and the entire District. I believe that more great achievements are to come in the 2016-17 school year. Go TUSD!

Tustin Unified School District's new Heritage Elementary STEAM Magnet School made history on August 29 – the first day of school – by opening its doors and welcoming students in transitional kindergarten and kindergarten through fifth grade. STEAM stands for science, technology, engineering, arts and math. The school is located in the Tustin Legacy development.

Teams of parents, teachers, and staff worked throughout the spring and summer building curriculum, preparing classrooms, launching a brand new Parent-Teacher Association, and planning for a rich learning environment.

According to Principal Beth Rabel Blackman, Heritage students will have the opportunity to strive for academic excellence; explore a diverse, project-based curriculum; prepare to succeed in a global environment; provide service to a growing community; participate in character education; experience cooperative educational communities in all content areas from fine arts to technology; and develop into lifelong learners.

"I'm thrilled to work with this school community and be part of the beginning of a new journey with our students and staff," Blackman said.

Parents of Heritage students are also abuzz with excitement over the school and many are volunteering in

the classroom and supporting the school in other ways.

"I'm excited my son is going to Heritage School because he will have opportunities and hands-on educational experiences, while working with students in a collaborative setting," said Ziggy McBride, parent of a fourth-grade Heritage student.

Heritage teachers and staff are equally ecstatic to be creating a culture of curiosity, creativity, and collaboration.

"At Heritage, teachers believe that children learn best through active, hands-on inquiry based experiences that

It is hard to believe I am entering my 11th year as the principal of Hillview High School. Over the years, I have come to realize Hillview is the most misunderstood school and the best-kept secret around. This year we will be centrally located in the district on the old Lambert site. The new location will make it easier for students to get to school.

Students come to Hillview because they are deficient in credits. Contrary to popular belief, students are not referred to Hillview for discipline issues. In fact, Hillview has one of the lowest suspension rates in the district.

Since we are much smaller (about 225 students), staff and students are able to develop good rapport. The students know the entire staff really cares about them, and,

in return, the students want to work for them.

Hillview’s diploma is equivalent to the comprehensive high school’s diploma, since all students have to earn 230 credits in order to graduate. Some students earn enough credits to return to the comprehensive high school, but the majority choose to remain in the smaller environment.

After graduation, many of our graduates go on to the community college. The counselors from the community colleges come and speak to our students, and the entire senior class visits the campus.

I am very appreciative of the community groups that assist Hillview. Thanks to the Kiwanis Club, the Rotary Club, the Soroptimist Club, and the Tustin Public Schools Foundation for their ongoing support.

Good Things On the Horizon

This fall Nelson Elementary will be launching our Creation Station, a makerspace where Tigers tinker. 



Car Seat Safety

Keeping Kids Safe in the Car

Many parents look to the law to 'guide buckling up their children safely in the car'. From 1/1/17, all children under 2 years old (unless 40 lbs. or 40" tall or more) must ride in a rear-facing safety seat. Pediatricians and safety professionals recommend children ride rear facing for as long as possible, until the maximum height or weight on the seat. Rear facing is 5 times safer! After age 2, California law requires children ride CORRECTLY in a safety seat or booster until age 8 and then, until the safety belt fits properly. But today, children often fit in a forward-facing seat until starting elementary school or longer. Use a booster until the belt fits properly, usually between 10 and 12 years old. By law, ride in back until age 8; however, the back is almost twice as safe, and labels in cars read stay in back to age 13.

Try this test in your car

1. Are you sitting all the way back against the auto seat?
2. Do your knees bend comfortably at the edge of the auto seat?
3. Does the belt cross your shoulder between your neck and arm?
4. Is the lap belt as low as possible to you, touching your thighs?
5. Can you stay seated like this for the whole trip?







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Tustin Unified Welcomes Over 24,000 Students for 2016-17

The Tustin Unified School District welcomed more than 24,000 students for the 2016-17 school year. The first day of school was Aug. 29.

“It will be an exciting and rewarding year for TUSD,” said Superintendent Dr. Gregory Franklin. “During the year, we will continue to focus on student achievement, student wellness, quality facilities, highly-qualified employees, fiscal responsibility and parent/community partnerships. We will also continue the implementation of the TUSD Connect initiative – rigorous standards and engaging instructional strategies supported by instructional technology.”

The new Heritage Elementary School, a science, technology, engineering, arts and math (STEAM) Magnet school for Transitional Kindergarten (TK) through fifth-grade students, opened at Tustin Legacy.

A Spanish Dual Language Immersion Magnet program launched at Marjorie Veeh Elementary School. TK, kindergarten and first grade students will learn to read, write and communicate in Spanish and English.

TUSD is piloting a full-day kindergarten program at W.R. Nelson Elementary School.

For the second year, Tustin Unified offers an online/independent study school called Tustin Connect Center, which serves students in kindergarten through eighth grade.

Among this summer’s school facilities projects, major upgrades took place at Jeane Thorman Elementary School, including classroom and library renovations and an expanded food service area, and a new two-story 12-classroom Humanities Building will open at Tustin High School. Both projects were funded through the Measure L campus modernization program.

Under the District’s deferred maintenance plan, several maintenance projects were performed at various school sites across the District, including painting, carpeting, roofing, slurry coating, playground replacements, building expansions, field upgrades and portable classroom additions/replacements.

During the past two years, Craven and his IT staff have successfully rolled out a one-to-one notebook program to TUSD's high schools and a tablet program to the District's elementary and middle schools. Understanding that not all students have Internet access at home to complete assignments, Craven is expanding outdoor Wi-Fi as well as piloting a program to provide students Internet access outside of school.

Kindergarten Readiness Program Honored For Excellence in Early Care and Education

The Tustin Unified School District's Kindergarten Readiness Program has been recognized at the Orange County Department of Education Excellence in Early Care and Education Awards.

The program was honored for being one of only 11 child care programs in Orange County to receive a five-star rating and one of only 13 programs to participate in the Child Signature Program, according to TUSD Coordinator of School Readiness Lauralee Cabibi.

OCDE bi-annually rates participating programs using QualityStart OC's Quality Rating and Improvement System. All candidates must commit to focus on high-quality across all program practices, which include attending trainings, receiving coaching and using program quality assessment information to create site continuous quality improvement plans. A maximum of five stars can be awarded based upon the level of quality above the minimum required by the state for all licensed programs.

TUSD School Cafeterias Get a Gold Star in Food Safety

The Environmental Health Division of Orange County has given the Award of Excellence to the school cafeterias at Currie, Pioneer and Utt middle schools; Orchard Hills School; and Beckman and Tustin high schools. The award is given to establishments in recognition of consistently protecting the residents and visitors of Orange County through excellence in food safety and sanitation at the food establishment.

Beckman has been recognized for the eighth time in nine years, Currie and Utt have received the award four years in a row, and Orchard Hills and Pioneer have been

honored two consecutive years.

The Award of Excellence Program was implemented in 1999 in an effort to encourage food establishments to strive for excellence in food safety and sanitation practices, and to recognize those who succeed. Award recipients included those establishments meeting eligibility as determined by a review of the establishment's inspection reports.

The inspection reports from these cafeterias indicate that the food handling practices and overall sanitation at their facilities were outstanding during the past year, according to TUSD Nutrition Services Director Teresa Squibb.
