Week Two of distance learning proved eventful. Teachers and students settled into more of a routine and a slightly known process. We received updated information on how long-distance learning might be in place, while still left with some important questions. Some reflected on silver linings in our situation, and good news continued to surface on the college front for senior Tillers.

I spent most of my time this week in virtual meetings with admin, secretaries and teachers.

Planning, managing and executing are still daily functions that constitute my time. My email account has always had no trouble populating, and currently the email pace has reached another level.

One of the benefits on meeting with teachers is gaining an understanding of their week, and their interaction with students. Last week concerns emerged about the percentage of students participating in distance learning lessons and assignments. While a majority of students checked in and engaged from the beginning, there were still students missing. It seems the word is starting to get out now that we are still in session, just from a distance. While we still don't know the exact parameters on grading, the work and learning going on now definitely counts. The TUSD Board of Education will offer more guidance next week, but distance learning provides an opportunity for students to learn, improve and show growth. Teachers have developed mini lessons, "check in" videos and assignments to support student learning. Additionally, teachers offered office hours to help with the learning process.

While the academic aspect of school continued, all be it in a much different format, extracurriculars have not. Teachers, students and staff have tried to come up with some solutions, but it is no doubt difficult based on the restrictions. On Monday, TUSD announced the school building was shut down until May 1st. Then less than 24 hours later, the governor of California effectively extended school closings until the end of the school year. As I looked at my calendar this week to enter new meetings established, I gained a sense of the scope of activities being cancelled: all athletic seasons, done; International Food Fair, canceled; International assembly, canceled; Prom, canceled; Hello-Goodbye Assembly, canceled. The list went on in my mind as I contemplated some of these traditions dear to our students and staff. I paused from sadness. I think there will be grieving for all of us, mostly our seniors. However, despite the disappointment, there are still opportunities to celebrate our students. There is a TUSD committee formed to creatively address end of the year activities. ASB and school staff are also thinking about how we can make the best of a challenging situation. Two events we are not willing to cancel completely are Senior Reflections and Graduation. I can't speak to exactly how those will work, but there is intent on figuring those two out for sure. Stay tuned.

While losing activities is painful for our students, especially our seniors, I was also reminded of important perspective during this time. Missing our normal schedule is an inconvenience, but there are people right now really suffering. Some have lost jobs, income and even family members. Both a

teacher and a student lost their mother this past week (no known connection to Covid19), and the prohibition on gathering makes that loss so much more painful to navigate. I know we have students and families who lost jobs during this time and are struggling. We empathize with you and want to be understanding as we try to do learning from a distance. When I think about it all, I feel sad, especially for our Tiller families impacted by this historic pandemic. Hang in there. While our primary function is to educate, we want to be supportive and connected most of all. One thing I have learned about this community, people are willing to help one another. We need that more than ever.

In the midst of the pain experienced this week, there were some silver linings. Multiple teachers and coaches shared how they have had the opportunity to connect with their own families. Coaches especially, sacrifice so much to pour into our student athletes. Many coaches have children of their own who no doubt get less of their mom or dad because their parents are so committed to growing, challenging and nurturing our students. Coaches don't complain about this reality (their spouses might), and they willingly accept their important role in the lives of so many students. However, these past two weeks have offered a gift of time and connection for families. I have even heard of students sharing how they appreciate the time spent with their own family. My hope is that out of all this, we don't forget about these lessons in months and years to come, and create some margin for each other to be connected at home and school.

We did receive some additional great news this week from college seniors. Many students are starting to hear about acceptance in colleges, and also financial packages available. I found out this week that three students offered acceptance with full financial benefits: Hailey Adams from Texas Christian University, Anaka Mahesh from USC and Natalia Murrieta from Stanford University. Additionally, I found out Monica Meza will attend Cal State Long Beach to earn a BFA in ceramics, and Victoria Shores was accepted to Howard University. All of these are exciting opportunities, and just a sampling of all the good news. Mrs. Vandal, the senior AVID teacher, sent me a list of all her students who were accepted into colleges. I am adding it all to the list! Please let me know your good news and I will add it to the list as well.

These college plans are good reminder that this pandemic thing will eventually end. There is still more inconvenience, disappointment and pain to come, but it will pass. Life will go on, and our current freshman, sophomores and juniors will come back next year with a fresh start, probably more appreciative of their Tiller experience. For seniors, they will move on to the next chapter of their life also with an appreciation for their Tiller experience, and hopefully for family and relational connection. While it is a challenging time, it is still a good time to be a Tiller.
